Well done to all our children for the effort and imagination they've put into their poetry work this week – we are super proud of them all!

In two weeks' time we will be continuing with exciting engagement with the written word as it is Big Write week, led by Miss Hill. I won't divulge details as we want it to be a total surprise for the children. You will hear all about it from them and of course in the newsletter!

This occasion is a really strong part of transition as the children love visiting their previous teachers and key workers – and it's also a chance for them to have a little visit to next year's classes. You will also be able to have a chat with staff and to celebrate all the fantastic work on the walls, and the fabulous learning environment.

Governors: I am delighted to announce that Mrs Davina Jordan, mum of Sophie in Walker Bear class has been appointed as our new Parent Governor. Mr Alan Kimble, dad of Elijah in Tawny Owl class, will join us as an Associate Governor.

Mrs Jordan writes:

"Hello to the Parents of Giles Nursery and Infants' School, my name is Davina Jordan and you may already know me from the FROG Team where I am directly involved in fundraising for the school and where I am one of the treasurers. Those of you who were at the school last year will remember the fantastic events that FROG put on, particularly the Christmas and Summer Fairs!

Having a child in Year 1 means that I have a real interest in the school and its future. We have been at the school for a year now and have seen how caring it is and how its nurturing environment means that it is a wonderful place that allows the children to grow and thrive. Being a Parent Governor would allow me to help support the school whilst being involved in the school's development moving forward by providing ideas to enrich the learning experience of the pupils who attend Giles. I also have a younger child of two so it means that I will have the longevity in the role for the coming years which will ensure that the plans are carried through so that the children have the best learning environment possible.

I believe that my role as a pharmacist provides me with many transferable skills that would be useful in the role of a School Governor. In my day-to-day role, I need to make level-headed decisions, I work as part of a team which makes me an excellent team player, and I am very good with numbers, which would be a positive attribute that could be applied to the financial side of the Governor role. As my job is predominantly public facing, I believe this would be a positive skill as I am exceptionally approachable, and I know that parents would be comfortable raising any concerns or ideas they may have, thus enabling me to provide them with a powerful voice. In addition, having worked in a managerial position for many years I excel at creating an environment where everyone's ideas are shared in a constructive manner, and where all points of view are considered.

Above all, my family have felt so welcomed by Giles and I would consider it a privilege to be involved in helping to continue to support making it the school that it is for our children and children in the future."

Volunteer work in school: We appreciate our volunteers so greatly and it is a role that in turn can give those who volunteer in school a lot of happiness. Our children are so fantastic and the teaching staff so incredible – it's an opportunity to make new friends and to pick up new skills at the same time as supporting our children's learning. Please speak to me if you are interested in doing some volunteer work in our school. Some volunteers also go on to do apprenticeships with us so if you are interested in this, do please speak to me.

Nursery: This week, the children had a fantastic time in the Giles bakery role play area. They have taken on the role of a customer, writing lists and using coins to pay for different types of bread, biscuits and cakes. Florence went shopping in the bakery, selected her favourite bread and commented, "Breads for you." The children took on the role of the baker, cooking the food and tidying the shop. Billy put bread in the oven and waited patiently, commenting, "Bread oven, it's ready now." Emily put on the oven gloves and said, "It's hot so I will need to get it for you." The shopkeeper used the till, wrote receipts and ordered supplies. Benjamin carefully served customers and said, "I've put the sausage roll in the bag for safety."

Our new nursery rhyme was 'Five Currant Buns'. The children loved practising and performing the song together as a class, in their groups and during play with their friends. In phonics, the children continued to practise their listening skills, identifying animals by a description and then making the correct animal noise.

The children shared the story 'Apples and Honey' by Jonny Zucker, which is about celebrating the Jewish New Year festival of Rosh Hashanah. They loved trying apple slices dipped in honey for a special snack. The children enjoyed printing with apples in red and green paint for our Celebrations display. They also explored pomegranate seeds and created a shofar.

The children enjoyed the story 'Each Peach Pear Plum' by Janet and Allan Ahlberg. The children were keen to find characters from well-known nursery stories, such as the Three Bears, Mother Hubbard and Tom Thumb.

Next week, our rhyme is 'Incy Wincy Spider', and the children will enjoy a range of activities about spiders. As part of Black History Month, we will read the story 'Big Hair, Don't Care' by Crystal Swain-Bates.

Thank you for attending the Nursery 'Meet the Keyworkers' this week. We hope you enjoyed your time with us and seeing how your children are settling in.

Reception: This week in literacy, the children have celebrated National Poetry Day by focusing on rhyming words in stories, poems and nursery rhymes. Their literacy activity was to match up rhyming pairs of objects. Talking about the words 'boat' and 'goat', Marshall in Barn Owl class said, "These rhyme. I just know it because I used my brain." Myles in Tawny Owl class exclaimed, "Lake rhymes with 'cake' and 'snake' as well!"

In mathematics, the children investigated weighing by investigating a range of weighted boxes. They were 'human scales', predicting which boxes would be heavier, lighter or the same. The children stretched out their arms to allow their partner to place a box in each hand and they moved their arms just like balancing scales. In a second mathematical activity, the children prepared for a picnic for Big Fox and Little Fox by unpacking a picnic basket of plates, cups, and cutlery of two different sizes. They had to discuss which size item would be best for each fox, using the mathematical language 'little', 'big', 'large' and 'small'.

The children had their first visit to the Enchanted Garden where they all had a marvellous time acting out the story of 'The Three Little Pigs'. When Joshua from Barn Owl class was pretending to be the Big Bad Wolf, he said, "The wolf knocked on the door and the pigs said, "Not by the hair on my chinny chin chin!" The children have also enjoyed watching the Disney version of 'The Three Little Pigs' called 'Silly Symphony'. It was made in 1958 and this version always makes the children laugh.

This week's poem is the nursery rhyme 'One, Two, Buckle My Shoe':

One, two, buckle my shoe,

*Three, four, knock at the door,
Five, six, pick up sticks,
Seven, eight, lay them straight,
Nine, ten, a big fat hen.*

Next week in literacy, the children will be generating a caption about the Big Bad Wolf from the story of 'The Three Little Pigs'. They will be using their fingers to count out the number of words in their caption and watching an adult model write their caption for them to order it.

In mathematics, the children will be investigating capacity and in a second activity will be copying and creating patterns using natural resources.

In expressive art and design, the children will be using a range of collage materials to create a puppet and then using their puppet to retell the story of 'The Three Little Pigs' in the Enchanted Garden.

In phonics, the children will be introduced to a new phonic term 'digraph.' This is when two letters are snapped together to make one sound, such as 'ck'.

To support your child in learning to read, the school subscribes to Bug Club, an online reading scheme. On the inside of your child's reading record there is a Bug Club label detailing your child's username, password, and school code. This reading scheme is a fantastic way to support your child's reading at home.

Year 1: Year 1 celebrated National Poetry Day by taking part in an inspiring and joyous workshop led by the poet Simon Mole, organised by Hertfordshire Libraries. The theme this year was counting. Simon began by sharing a few of his own poems with the children, before challenging them to create 'happiness equations' and then class poems using alliteration and a countdown format. The children loved his funny poems and came up with some wonderful ideas of their own. Evie from Red Fox class said, "I love poems. They make me laugh and smile." In English, the children enjoyed listening to the autumnal story 'Ferdie and the Falling Leaves' by Julia Rawlinson and Tiphonie Beeke. They began by looking closely at a picture from the book and completing an 'I can see...' sentence, using finger spaces between words. They sequenced pictures of the changing tree, using words such as 'first', 'next' and 'finally'.

In phonics, the children focused on initial and final blends in words such as 'slept'. They practised reading and writing words, distinguishing carefully the sounds within the blends. They learnt to read the common exception words 'were', 'there', 'little' and 'one' and the high frequency word 'help'. They learnt to spell the words 'they', 'all', 'are' and 'just'.

Our Book of the Week was 'Child of Galaxies' by Blake Nuto and Charlotte Ager, a beautiful reflection on life. You can listen to it here [Child of Galaxies](#).

In mathematics, the children consolidated their understanding of 'greater than', 'less than' and 'more than'. They practised putting numbers in order, using lots of resources to do so. You could play this game at home: roll three dice and put them in order from smallest to greatest or from greatest to smallest. You could also do it by dealing three playing cards (not the picture cards) and ordering the cards. Alternatively, you could create three different sized groups of toys and put them in order.

The children learnt about the sense of sight in science. They learnt about different parts of the eye and played a game looking at items on a tray which were then covered up. When it was uncovered an item had been removed. Could they work out which item was missing? The children discussed visual impairment, using spectacles, the value of reading braille, and the assistance that guide dogs can provide.

In RE, the children learnt about harvest festivals and reflected on their own gratitude for their favourite foods, the people involved in growing and making them, and the natural world for producing nourishment.

The children enjoyed using glockenspiels in music this week to play in time with a song all about shapes. They learnt to find the notes C and D and to use the beater to strike the note on the count of one.

Next week, the children will create posters to encourage people to read the story 'Ferdie and the Falling Leaves' in English. They will learn about the number line in mathematics and show their teachers how much their brains have grown, learning all about place value. In science, they will learn about the sense of smell. Please return your child's homework book by Wednesday 9th October. We are looking forward to seeing your wonderful home-learning activities.

Year 1 Stay-and-Play will take place in classrooms from 2.45 next Thursday 10th October. We look forward to seeing you then.

Year 2: We have had a wonderful week in Year 2. On Wednesday, the children took part in a National Poetry Day workshop with the poet Simon Mole, organised by Hertfordshire Libraries. They joined around 2,000 children from across the county via Microsoft Teams. This year's Poetry Day theme was counting. With Simon's guidance, the children created some fantastic addition and counting poems. They worked beautifully together, listening and choosing ideas. You can find out more about Simon Mole, including poetry events he runs and books he has published, at [Simon Mole](#).

In English, the children applied what they learnt last week to write their own set of instructions explaining how to clean a crocodile's teeth. They drew diagrams, wrote a title and a list of the items that are needed, before writing a set of numbered instructions with time conjunctions and bossy verbs.

In mathematics, the children explored number lines to 100. They learnt how to identify tens on the number line, before learning how to identify tens and ones. The children used these skills to estimate numbers on a number line.

In computing, the children continued to learn how to code. They learnt how to use a timer to control when objects appear or move. They programmed a magician's rabbit to appear at a particular time. In science, the children learnt why dental health is so important and how to brush their teeth properly. In design and technology, the children recalled what they know about healthy eating and designed a healthy, balanced meal. In art and design, they applied their learning about line to create a crocodile collage. In PSHCE, the children worked in groups to discuss how the behaviour we choose affects others.

Next week, the children will learn all about harvest and enjoy some harvest themed activities. In mathematics, they will learn how to compare numbers, how to order objects and numbers, and how to count in twos, fives, tens and threes.

In science, the children will think of ways to investigate the effect of different drinks on our teeth. In computing, they will learn about different object types in code. In design technology, the children will design a healthy salad to accompany a meal and in PSHCE, they will learn how following the class charter helps everyone to learn.

The children will also be preparing for the Year 2 class concerts, which will take place as follows:
