Children were absolutely amazed to learn on Monday morning that a number of Aladdin magic lamps had mysteriously appeared in my office. Miss Wright filmed me finding these magical objects and reacting with astonishment! She went on to film each teacher attempting different methods to see if they could unleash the magic in the lamps.

The week started with a fabulous assembly when we shared this film with all the children. They were so excited and all week have been coming up with incredible ideas of their own. 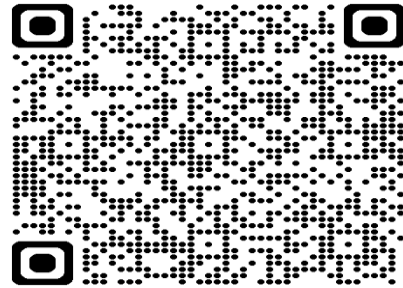

Open Evening Thursday 20th November 5.00pm to 6.30pm: *This is a lovely opportunity for you to come into school with your children and have a good look round not only your child's current class but also previous classes as well as the year-group your child will be in next year. This occasion is a really strong part of transition as the children love visiting their previous teachers and key workers – and it's also a chance for them to have a little visit to next year's classes. You will also be able to have a chat with staff and to celebrate all the fantastic work on the walls, and the fabulous learning environment.*

Volunteer work in school: *We appreciate our volunteers so greatly and it is a role that in turn can give those who volunteer in school a lot of happiness. Our children are so fantastic and the teaching staff so incredible – it's an opportunity to make new friends and to pick up new skills at the same time as supporting our children's learning. Please speak to me if you are interested in doing some volunteer work in our school. Some volunteers also go on to do apprenticeships with us, so if you are interested in this, do please speak to me.*

Black History Month: *October is Black History Month. Over the next few weeks, the children will learn about its importance and find out about significant black figures from history and in society today.*

Bulbs or plant donations: All the school planters will be sown and re-potted between now and half-term. Donations of bulbs, plants or seeds will be gratefully received.

Nursery: This week, the children have been fascinated to learn all about spiders. They looked at non-fiction books about spiders, discussed many facts and watched a timelapse video of a spider web being spun. The children learnt about different spiders, explored how spiders catch their food and learnt that spiders have eight legs and eight eyes. Zadie remembered, "Spiders are arachnids."



In understanding the world, the children explored the Nursery garden looking for spider webs. They thought about where to look and suggested looking on the walls, under the shelter, around the windows and in the bushes. Isla was fascinated to see a spider in its web in the garden and commented, "They have hairy bodies."

Our nursery rhyme this week was 'Incy Wincy Spider'. The children enjoyed creating sparkly spider webs with glitter and handprint spiders. They loved using playdough to create 3D spiders and used a range of resources to create legs. The children worked well as a group to create a large spider web by carefully throwing a ball of wool to each other to make the spider web strands. Incy Wincy Spider then came to balance on the web. Well done Ladybirds, fabulous team work! Mason recalled his favourite fact about spiders, stating "The big black spider eats birds."

In phonics, the children played a game of Grandma's Footsteps. First, they decided what movement goes with which sound; for example, shakers for walking on tiptoes, a triangle for fairy steps and a drum for giant strides. The children had lots of fun identifying the instrument being played and responding with the correct movement.

Next week, the children will learn about Diwali and take part in a range of activities to celebrate.

Reception: This week in Big Write, the children enjoyed listening to a story about a wolf called Wilfred in 'The Healthy Wolf' by David Bedford. They found out Wilfred did not look after himself and after many years of not eating healthily, nor looking after his teeth, and not doing any exercise, he was a very unhealthy wolf. Wilfred the wolf visited the classes and sat in the 'hot seat' answering questions from the children. When asking Wilfred the wolf a question, Arlo in Snowy Owl class said, "I love this, it is so funny!"

For the Big Write activity, the children used phonic mats as means of support to label parts of Wilfred the wolf's body and wrote a caption about him or about ways to be

healthy. Archie in Barn Owl class wrote a caption stating, 'the wolf was fed up' and when asked why, Archie replied, "Because he wants to be a healthy wolf."

This week in phonics, the children have learnt the phonemes 'h', 'b', 'f', 'ff', 'l', 'll' and 'ss'. Please see below the patten the staff use to help the children form the letters correctly.

'h' – Start at the top and come all the way down, bounce halfway back up, go over, down and flick.

'b' – Start at the top, come all the way down, bounce halfway back up and go all the way round.

'f' – Make a curve, come all the way down, curve to the left. Lift and cross.

'l' – Start at the top, come all the way down and flick.

This week's poem is 'How many people live in your house?'

In mathematics, the children enjoyed playing a game where they had to represent up to three actions using counters. For example, if a child clapped twice, the other children had to place two counters on a five-frame board.



Please see below some of the children's 'Three Little Pig' scenes now their grass in the garden has grown. The children are so immensely proud and were so excited when they were told they could take these home at the end of the school day.



Next week is Science Week in Reception and the focus is 'Healthy Living'. The children will participate in a range of activities to find out how to maintain a healthy lifestyle. They will listen to the story 'Ready, Steady, Mo!' by the athlete Mo Farah and participate in some fun and energetic activities in PE to discover the importance of exercise.

The children will answer questions by the character 'Supersoap' when reading a story about the importance of washing hands. They will find out why they should clean their teeth twice a day and about the importance of having a healthy diet. One of the activities linked to healthy diet will be to taste a selection of fruit and vegetables. The children will act out a bedtime routine using dolls, making sure they have cleaned their teeth, and each will read a bedtime story to a doll. They will participate in activities to relax their bodies through meditation and mindfulness.

Now the colder weather is approaching, your child will be wearing a coat to school every day. Please encourage your child to put their coat on by themselves and show them how to do the zip up. Each class has a star chart encouraging the children to put their coats on and do their coat zip up independently.

Reception Parent Consultations will be taking place on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday. We look forward to seeing you then.

Year 1: This week has been Big Write and what a wondrous week it has been. On Monday, the children were amazed that a special assembly had to take place. They saw a video explaining that a lot of magic lamps had arrived in school and showing the teachers trying to make the lamps work. Maxi in Walker Bear class said, "You have to rub it!" When the children got back to class, they found a lamp had appeared in their classrooms. Eliza excitedly cried, "I can't believe we have one!" The Year 1 children designed their own lamps and thought of adjectives to describe them. Some children challenged themselves to use the 'power of three' by thinking of three words to describe their lamps. Towards the end of the week, the children were given special paper and asked to write about their lamp. The results are fabulous! Well done Year 1!

In mathematics, the children continued to learn about addition. They practised writing addition sentences using the symbols for 'add' and 'equals'. They learnt about fact families such as:

$$2 + 3 = 5$$

$$3 + 2 = 5$$

$$5 = 3 + 2$$

$$5 = 2 + 3$$

Science was very exciting this week. The children explored the sense of taste. First, they listened to the story 'Oliver's Fruit Salad' by Vivian French. Then they tasted a range of fruits. They described the tastes using words such as 'sweet', 'bitter' and 'sour'. They collected data to show how many children liked each fruit and their class teachers demonstrated how to use a chart to display the results. The children thought about their personal favourites and designed a fruit kebab.

In computing, the children enjoyed surveying each other to find out answers to the questions, 'How do you get to school?', 'What is your favourite colour?' and 'What is

your favourite animal?' They used 2Count in Purple Mash to create charts to represent the data that they collected. They learnt why collecting data can be beneficial and ways it can be displayed.

The children were fascinated to learn about the Jewish festival of Sukkot in RE. They made a picture of a sukkah and listened carefully to the story 'Sammy Spider's First Sukkot' by Sylvia A. Rouss.

Next week, the children will make and eat a fruit kebab based on the fruit tasting this week and their own design. English next week will be talk-based. The children will research some significant Black people in history as part of Black History Month. They will then work in teams to present information to the class. In mathematics, the children will learn about number bonds within and to ten. In RE, the children will learn about special books, with special focus on the Torah.

Please will you return your child's homework book by Wednesday 22nd October. We look forward to seeing your beautiful home-learning activities.

You should have received a letter about Forest School, which will start the second week after the half term holiday. Please speak to your child's class teacher if you have any questions.

***Year 2:** It has been a very exciting week in Year 2, following the delivery of some dusty, cobweb covered magic lamps. The children were invited to a special assembly where they were shown a video of the lamps appearing in Mrs Mendel's office, followed by the teachers trying different ways to make the genies in the lamps appear to grant wishes. When the children went back to their classrooms, they discovered a lamp had been delivered to them, along with a letter asking for their help to get the genie out of the lamp. Luca in Pelican class exclaimed, "I think we better go outside before the lamp explodes!" The children designed their own lamp and thought what they would ask for, if they were to have a wish granted. Evie in Puffin class suggested, "Miss Hill would wish to be a famous dancer!"

The children then used their recent learning to write a set of instructions explaining how they would get the lamp to work. Mauro in Penguin class suggested creeping up on the lamp and giving it some food, before giving it a kiss! All the children did an excellent job for their first Big Write piece of Year 2. Well done!

In mathematics, the children started a new unit focusing on addition and subtraction. They revised the bonds to ten, which they learnt in Year 1, and explored addition and subtraction bonds within 20, learning strategies to work them out quickly.

Throughout Year 2, the children practise counting in twos, fives, tens and threes. This is an introduction to learning about multiplication and times tables. If you would like

to support your child at home, you can practise skip counting to learn the numbers that appear in each times table, as follows:

Count in twos:	2	4	6	8	10	12	14	16	18	20
Count in fives:	5	10	15	20	25	30	35	40	45	50
Count in tens:	10	20	30	40	50	60	70	80	90	100
Count in threes:	3	6	9	12	15	18	21	24	27	30

In computing, the children learnt about the function of buttons in a program. In design technology, they learnt how to cut and chop vegetables safely and had a try using wooden lollipop sticks and playdough.

Next week, the children will learn about onomatopoeia as they write poems about rainy weather. In mathematics, the children will continue to learn about addition and subtraction, focusing on the bonds to 100. They will make the healthy salads that they designed last week and record the results of their science investigation exploring the effect of different liquids on teeth.

The children will also finish preparing for the Year 2 class concerts, which will take place as follows:

Puffin class – Tuesday 21st October at 2.30pm
Pelican class – Wednesday 22nd October at 2.30pm
Penguin class – Thursday 23rd October at 2.30pm



